2007 Legislative Voting Record

House Bill 215 – Rep. Krayton Kerns (R-Laurel): This bill sought to ban human cloning in Montana. The Network does not have an official position on cloning. However, during the hearings on HB 215, it was clear the Religious Right considered the bill a way to undermine sound science in the name of Christian fundamentalism. The bill passed the House, and the vote used is from second reading, which passed 61-39. The Senate Judiciary Committee tabled the bill. The recorded Senate vote is from a blast motion, which failed 24-26. (O)

House Bill 289 – Rep. Shannon Augare (D-Browning): This bill would have established a state earned income tax credit. This type of tax credit is the most successful type of anti-poverty legislation. The amount of the credit was based on 20% of the federal earned income tax credit. The bill died in House Taxation. The vote used is from a blast motion in the House, which failed 49-50. (S)

House Bill 306 – Rep. Rick Jore (C-Ronan): The bill sought to limit the state’s ability to enter into cooperative agreements with tribal governments. During a hearing on the bill, Rep. Jore said HB 306 resulted from his opposition to tribal governments having jurisdiction over all land within a reservation’s boundaries. This confirmed that the bill was Jore’s latest attempt to undermine tribal sovereignty, which he has said “flies in the face of everything that this country is all about.” The bill died in the House on second reading, 36-64. (O)

House Bill 312 – Rep. Michael Lange (R-Billings): This bill would have amended the state constitution to establish parental rights. The Religious Right has used “parental rights” as an umbrella term for the movement’s overall objectives of limiting reproductive freedom, promoting homophobia, and undermining public education. The rights of parents are already well-established in court precedent, making the bill unnecessary. The bill passed the House 51-49. The Senate Judiciary Committee tabled the bill. (O)

House Bill 321 – Rep. Tom McGillvray (R-Billings): The bill would have revised the judicial bypass provision under the Parental Notice of Abortion Act. Montana courts have already struck down the parental notification law as unconstitutional. This made the anti-choice HB 321 unconstitutional and a blatant attempt by the Religious Right to restrict access to abortion. The bill passed the House 55-45. The Senate Public Health, Welfare and Safety Committee tabled the bill. Two blast motions failed in the Senate. The recorded Senate vote is from the second blast motion that failed 25-25. (O)

House Bill 340 – Rep. Jack Wells (R-Bozeman): The bill was part of a national strategy by the gun rights lobby to pass “Shoot First” legislation at the state level across the country. Gary Marbut of the Montana Shooting Sports Association drafted much of HB 340, which he said enhanced people’s ability to use weapons in self-defense. This

Terms Used in Voting Record

Tabling a bill: The committee hearing a bill generally takes one of two actions. It can pass the bill onto its respective full chamber (the House or Senate), or it can table the legislation. Tabling a bill signals that a majority of the committee does not believe the bill should become a law.

Blasting a bill: Just because a bill is tabled does not mean it is dead. A lawmaker can make a “blast” motion on the floor of the Senate or House. This motion is to take a bill from a committee’s table and bring it to the floor for debate. A blast motion in the House requires 60 votes to pass, while in the Senate it only takes a simple majority.

“Readings” for a bill: To become law, a bill faces three votes in both the Senate and House. The first vote happens at the committee level. The second and third votes happen on the Senate and House floors during second and third readings. Generally, a simple majority vote, or a tie vote, can kill a bill.

included provisions allowing anyone to carry concealed weapons without a permit. It also stated that landlords and hotels couldn't keep weapons off their property. Opponents to the bill from law enforcement said the bill gave new rights to criminals. The House passed the bill 57-42. The Senate Judiciary Committee tabled HB 340. The recorded Senate vote was a blast motion, which failed 19-29. (O)

House Bill 387 – Rep. Mary Caferro (D-Helena): The bill would have increased the number of children eligible for the Children's Health Insurance Program. It allowed the Department of Public Health and Human Services to open the program to kids in families with a combined income at or below 151% to 200% of the poverty level. The House Appropriations Committee tabled the bill. The recorded House vote is for a blast motion that passed with a simple majority 52-47; however, the motion needed 60 votes to be successful. (S)

House Bill 403 – Rep. Rick Jore (C-Ronan): The bill was a proposed constitutional amendment stating that everyone has a "paramount and fundamental right to life" and life begins at conception. During a hearing on the bill, Jore said he envisioned HB 403 granting the constitutional rights of due process to fetuses. The bill's intention was to infringe on a woman's right to choose. This became clear when language was added to the bill stating that its passage would not stop the State of Montana from imposing capital punishment in criminal cases. The bill died in the House on third reading 45-53. (O)

House Bill 492 – Rep. Dennis Himmelberger (R-Billings): The bill was an attempt to keep restaurant workers from receiving the cost-of-living increase that was part of the new minimum-wage law passed by voters in 2006. Voters established \$6.15/hour as the minimum wage starting in January 2007, with an annual cost-of-living increase tied to the Consumer Price Index. HB 492 would have exempted food servers and other restaurant employees who usually receive tips from the annual increase. The bill passed the House 51-49. The Senate Taxation Committee tabled the bill. (O)

House Bill 525 – Rep. Roger Koopman (R-Bozeman): The bill claimed to promote "intellectual diversity" at Montana universities. In reality, it was part of a national right-wing campaign led by David Horowitz that claims higher education is too liberal. The bill died in the House on second reading 43-57. (O)

House Bill 549 – Rep. Dennis Himmelberger (R-Billings): This was one of many bills designed to capitalize on the politics of resentment aimed at undocumented immigrants during the current debate over immigration reform. This bill required the Justice Department to make applicants for drivers' licenses take an English proficiency test and determine the applicant's citizenship status. The bill died in the House on second reading 47-53. (O)

House Bill 597 – Rep. Ron Stoker (R-Darby): The bill was an outgrowth of the Religious Right's attempt to pass censorship laws in the form of obscenity ordinances. The main activist behind the ordinances, Dallas Erickson, has been working to pass them at the local and state levels since the 1990s. The ordinances passed in Ravalli County, home to both Erickson and Stoker, were later struck down by a district court for being too broad and more restrictive than state law. This bill would have allowed local governments to pass ordinances stricter than state law, giving Erickson's campaign new life. The bill passed the House 68-31. The Senate Judiciary Committee tabled it. (O)

House Bill 712 – Rep. Rick Jore (C-Ronan): This bill catered to the anti-government's conspiracy theories about one-world government and hatred of the United Nations. Calling the United Nations Charter a "constitution for world government," the bill outlawed the flying of a UN flag on any public building. It also made it illegal for the legislature or any political subdivision of the State of Montana to spend funds to participate in any UN program. Any violations of the bill would be punished as misdemeanors. The bill passed the House 50-49. It was tabled by the Senate Judiciary Committee. (O)

House Bill 783 – Rep. Bob Lake (R-Hamilton): This bill made it a felony for an undocumented immigrant to register to vote. As it is already illegal for non-citizens to register to vote, the bill was a blatant attempt to capitalize on the fear and hatred of undocumented immigrants that is running rampant during the current debate over immigration reform. The bill passed the House 50-49; however, it was tabled by the Senate State Administration Committee. (O)

Senate Bill 22 – Sen. Dan Weinberg (D-Whitefish): The bill increased the number of children eligible for the Children’s Health Insurance Program. It allowed the Department of Public Health and Human Services to open the program to kids in families with a combined income at or below 175% of the poverty level. The bill passed the Senate 31-19 and the House 63-36. It has been signed into law. (S)

Senate Bill 258 – Sen. Jim Shockley (R-Victor): This was one of many bills designed to capitalize on the politics of resentment aimed at undocumented immigrants during the current debate over immigration reform. The bill prohibited undocumented immigrants from obtaining or renewing professional and occupational licenses. The bill died in the Senate on third reading 25-25. (O)

Senate Bill 260 - Sen. Jim Shockley (R-Victor): This bill made it a felony for an undocumented immigrant to register to vote. As it is already illegal for non-citizens to register to vote, the bill was a blatant attempt to capitalize on the fear and hatred of undocumented immigrants that is running rampant during the current debate over immigration reform. The bill died on the Senate floor. The vote used is a motion to indefinitely postpone the bill, which passed 30-20. (O)

Senate Bill 306 – Sen. Dan Harrington (D-Butte): The bill would have abolished the death penalty in Montana and replaced it with life in prison without possibility of parole. The bill passed the Senate 27-22. SB 306 was tabled by the House Judiciary Committee. The recorded House vote is from a blast motion, which won a simple majority, 51-49. However it needed 60 votes to be successful. (S)

Senate Bill 371 – Sen. Christine Kaufmann (D-Helena): The bill sought to include sexual orientation and gender identity into the state’s Human Right Act, Montana’s bedrock civil rights law. The Senate Judiciary Committee tabled the bill. The recorded Senate vote is for a blast motion, which failed 23-26. (S)

Senate Bill 389 - Sen. Jim Shockley (R-Victor): This was one of many bills designed to capitalize on the politics of resentment aimed at undocumented immigrants during the current debate over immigration reform. The bill would have allowed a police officer to stop any individual for questioning, if the officer suspected the person had violated federal immigration law. The bill encouraged the use of racial profiling and would have facilitated officers targeting Montanans of color. The bill was tabled by the Senate Judiciary Committee. The recorded Senate vote is a blast motion, which failed 25-25. (O)

Senate Bill 390 – Sen. Carol Juneau (D-Browning): The bill sought to increase funding for the “Indian Education for All” program. The Montana Constitution mandates that all public-school children be taught Native American culture and history. While the provision has been in the state constitution for over 30 years, the State of Montana did not provide funding for it until the 2005 Montana Legislature. SB 390 asked for an increase in funding. The bill passed the Senate 28-22. The House Education Committee tabled the measure. (S)

Senate Bill 400 – Sen. Christine Kaufmann (D-Helena): This bill would have established a state earned income tax credit. This type of tax credit is the most successful type of anti-poverty legislation. The amount of the credit was based on 15% of the federal earned income tax credit. The bill was changed and the percentage was reduced to 5% of the federal earned income tax credit. The Senate passed the bill, and the recorded vote is from second reading, which passed 38-11. The bill was tabled by the House Appropriations Committee. (S)

Senate Bill 481 – Sen. Dave Wanzonried (D-Missoula): The bill required all people getting married to be informed of the legal rights and responsibilities that go with marriage. The Network supported the bill, believing it encouraged discussion of marriage as a legal contract. It also helped identify the rights “straight” couples receive through marriage that the State of Montana denies gay and lesbian couples. The bill passed the Senate 30-20. It was tabled by the House Judiciary Committee. (S)

Senate Bill 498 – Sen. Christine Kaufmann (D-Helena): The bill required the Department of Public Health and Human Services to establish a working group to design a universal healthcare system for Montana. The department would submit a proposal to the Montana Legislature by Sept. 15, 2008, to establish a universal healthcare system to begin in January 2011. The bill passed the Senate 29-21. It was tabled by the House Appropriations Committee. (S)

Senate Bill 500 – Sen. Christine Kaufmann (D-Helena): The bill sought to remove the prohibition against using the Children’s Health Insurance Program for contraception. As a pro-choice group advocating economic justice, the Network supported this bill. The bill died on the Senate floor on third reading 25-25. (S)

Senate Bill 560 – Sen. Christine Kaufmann (D-Helena): The bill sought to increase Montana’s gaming tax to fund healthcare for all children in the state. The Senate Public Health, Welfare and Safety tabled the bill. The recorded Senate vote is from a blast motion that failed 16-34. (S)
